## SEARCH AND CREATION TOOLS

### December Meeting Report

The Medical Letter On Drugs and Therapeutics (“TML”), published weekly or more often, reviews and provides comparisons of efficacy of drugs, many of which are

FDA-controlled Schedule 1 or 2 drugs.. Each TML issue focuses on drugs and related treatments for one or two maladies. For example, the 1 October 2001 issue focused on long-acting methylphenidate (Metadate CD), which is used for treatment of attention deficit/hyperactivity disorder (AD/HD), and on placenta blood (“cord blood”) transplantation. Don Gardner, Director of Informatics for TML, with headquarters in New

Rochelle, NY, discussed performance of a serious search among periodicals, such as TML.

Sherlock search capability is available on OS 8.2 and more recent OS releases. However, Sherlock has not (yet) been updated to handle PDF 4 or 5. Gardner recommends using Acrobat Reader With Search, available from Adobe, to index and search a periodical such as TML. One first forms PDFs, then uses Acrobat Reader With Search and Acrobat Catalog for the searching and indexing. Acrobat Reader has cross-platform capability (Mac, Windows, UNIX). A 20-Mbyte PDF file will typically produce a 5-Mbyte index file. A search can use wildcard characters, Boolean operators, proximity searching and an intriguing “sounds like” word stem search capability. This requires use of OS 8.2 or later. TML carries no advertising. Each article is anonymous but is written by an authority in that field. The index is expandable. Gardner recommended beginning with an index of new articles, then adding older articles to the index. Gardner demonstrated indexing of a previously performed search.

Gavin Carothers discussed iTools, Apple’s new Internet service, for which OS 9 or later is recommended. OS10 was constructed, in part, to take advantage of iTools capability. As an example, a stock or custom-created holiday

greeting card can be chosen, embellished and sent across the Web, using iCards. [I have received such greetings this Christmas from clients and would-be suppliers. The effect is no more impersonal than the plastic sincerity “hard copy” cards offered by holiday card suppliers] Any e-mail program can read a card put together and sent using iTools. Registering for an iTools account allows access to iDisk, which provides 20 Mbytes storage on a pseudo-server for the registered user, plus e-mail forwarding, plus use of iCards (5 Mbytes maximum per card, with 5 fonts available), plus Web page construction, plus thumbnail pages, plus sharing of a Web page. Carothers demonstrated construction of a Web page with text, color images, captions, etc. and demonstrated construction of a resume. Most iTools features don’t work on OS 8 but will work on OS9 and OS10. On the PC side, Windows 98 or later is required to use most of the corresponding features.

## REVIEW ON THE FUJITSU MAGNETO-OPTICAL (MO) REMOVABLE STORAGE DRIVE

Fred Balin asked me to write a review on the Fujitsu MO removable drive. I happened to get one free by just pure luck the night Fujitsu was demonstrating the drive at SMUG. I happened to win the drawing for a new one. They also handed out a FREE removable media to each person in attendance.

I have an older Mac G-3 Mini-tower and didn't have a fire-wire attachment. The drive was configured for fire-wire. I also have a considerable investment in lomega drives and disks. [1 GB Jaz & 100 KB Zip] They have been my media of choice for backups for years. In the course of the next few months I damaged both of my Zip Drives and found that nobody out there repairs them. All recommended that I buy new ones.

Enter the Fujitsu MO. I contacted "On Time" in Redwood City and asked about the cost of installing a fire-wire connection. I agreed and two days later I began using my new drive.

I have been delighted overall with the results. The drives are easy to handle and you have a secure feeling when the disks lock into the drive. In the later days of my Zips the fitting into the drive seemed sloppy. I had them several years and I had increasing trouble with the Zip first recognizing the disks and then ejecting them. I trust that lomega has solved this problem in their 2 GB Jaz and 250 MG Zips. Fujitsu, at least in my first 4 months of using it, doesn't have any recognition or eject problems and the disks run fast and clean. Although I started using them just for backup, once a week, I began to start using them as another hard drive on the desktop and again have been delighted with the results. The integration to the Mac has been seamless and the results have been perfect.

Because of the added uses I found a need for more disks. I have and continue to have a standing offer to the SMUG members in attendance the evening of the demonstrations to buy their Fujitsu MO disks for five dollars each. About ten members have taken me up on the offer. A good deal for them and a great deal for me. I get 230 MB of drive space and they get rid of a piece of equipment they have no use for-unless they buy a MO drive. All in all I have been extremely pleased with the performance and recommend it highly. I recommend fire-wire also. Unfortunately because I have only used the drive for four months I can't give an opinion on the longevity of the product or technical support from Fujitsu. If I run into any trouble I will report back to the membership.

## Tip O' the Month

*From Leo's Mac Tip*

Gavin told us about Apple's free webspace service - iTools. Owen Saxton discovered this:

Once you have set up your iTools account via the web interface (you need OS 9 to be able to do this), you can use the Chooser to mount your iDisk on the desktop. To do this, open the Chooser, select AppleShare and click on the "Server IP Address..." button. In the dialog box that appears, type "idisk.mac.com" as the name of the server. This will (it may take a while) bring up the standard "Connect to File Server" dialog box, in which you type your iTools name and password. This in turn brings up the standard disk list dialog box, containing just your iDisk. Click "OK" and your iDisk will be mounted. Even though you need OS 9 to set up an iTools account, you can mount your iDisk using any version of the OS since 8.1.

## SIMPLY MAC

*Mac basics we sometimes forget*

How to make that window go away? This is a basic problem on computers - when doing more than one thing, we need to hide other activities which take up screen space. Early in the Mac OS game, Apple invented the Hide function in the application menu (right end of menu bar). Even easier is the fact that clicking in any covered up window to bring it to the front (doesn't make the old window go away, just takes over most of its real estate). But with OS 7, Apple adopted a new way - one adopted from shareware - windowshades. Doubleclick on the title bar and the window vanishes - except the title bar. In OS 8 Apple extended this by adding a windowshade button to the title bar.

OS X changed all this. Windows no longer vanish or roll up - but they DO go away - to the dock. In fact, if you want the current window to vanish, do just what you did before - click on the vanish button, or even doubleclick on the title bar. The window now sits in the dock waiting to be revived.

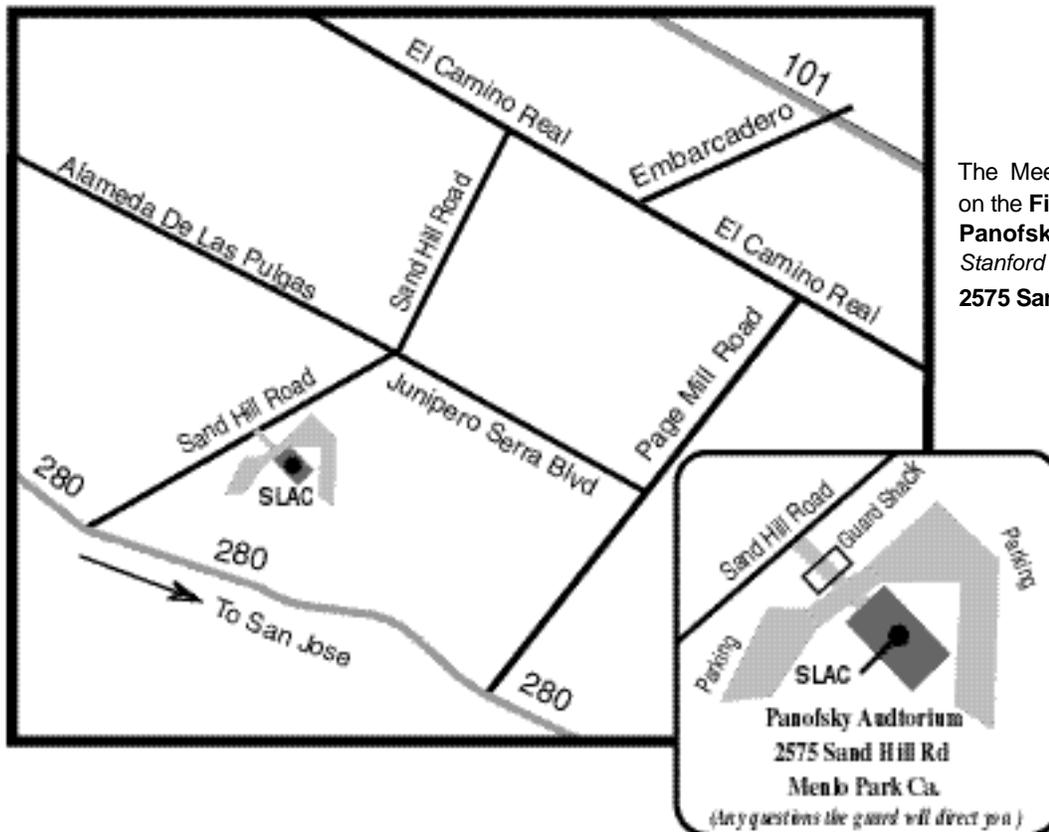
