Meet Stewart Hersey

Stewart Hersey is SMUG's newest Board member, filling out the term of Kathryn Johnston, who is leaving for Japan. Ironically, Stewart has an intimate connection with Japan, its culture, and people.

Stewart is a Montreal native and a child of professional musicians. His father was a Jazz drummer, his mother a pianist, and Stewart developed an early interest in both classical and blues guitar.

But he also developed a fascination with martial arts, judo, and karate, and as a teenager became a Canadian champion.

At McGill University, Stewart began working with Apple computers and realized their special potential for both teaching and learning.

In 1990, he traveled to Japan for his graduate research and used Macs to teach English as Second Language to his Japanese hosts. In Japan, Stewart also worked as a technical writer, developing copy for large corporations, such as Jaguar/Japan, Hitachi, and SONY. He also was named Secretary of the World Karate Federation and in competition, became Japanese all-karate champion.

Back in Montreal after graduation from McGill, Stewart met Fumie Ito, the daughter of a Japanese organic rice farmer, who was studying French. They were married in 1996 in a large mountainside ceremony in Japan. Stewart's father and grandmother flew out with his wedding present, a PowerMac 8600.

During a second extended stay in Japan, Stewart was a partner in one of the first Internet Service Providers in the country, which, of course, used Mac servers. Later, however, he "retired" from technical and academic ventures and moved to the Nagano Highlands to assist his in-laws in growing organic rice and vegetables.

After four years, Stewart and his family returned to North America and to technical pursuits. Eventually he

came to California and joined Stanford as a technical writer and trainer.

Stewart is a young man with tremendous enthusiasm and energy, and we're very pleased to have him join our Board. Please introduce yourself to Stewart the next time you see him.

OS X Presentation Notes from February SMUG Meeting.

If you were at our last meeting you were treated to, and perhaps participated in, the discussion and explanation of the many facets of Apple's new OS X/OS X10.1 operating system. The demonstrations shown on SLAC's big viewing screen were quite impressive.

Noteworthy is the fact that the whole system architecture has been changed to combine the high powered UNIX system

with the simplicity and elegance of the Macintosh operating interface. But this all comes at a price, for now, OS X 10.1 requires a Power Mac G3, G4, G4 Cube, or iBook computer; and a minimum of 128 MB of physical RAM (256 MB is better). The original PowerBook G3 and processor upgrade cards are not supported.

I suppose this means either getting new equipment—software—scanners/printers or string along a while longer with a older PowerMac or earlier Mac. But the new features are really snazzy like the Dock at the bottom of the screen and the ability to run OS 9X applications or the new OS X 10/10.1 applications. Most Mac software written now will be for OS X 10.+ so the handwriting is on the wall.

Time marches on and like Judy G. said: *Toto—I don't think were in Kansas anymore*. Well welcome to the new world, and please do come to our monthly SMUG meetings and keep abreast of the latest in the never-ending quest for the best in Macintosh computer technology.

Just recently Alps Electric Co. decided to discontinue making and selling the Alps printers. As you know they use thermal-ribbon technology and are superb for their really excellent image quality—and unlike ink jets they give waterproof copies. When I called Alps they indicated they would continue supporting their printers for some years to come. This includes supplies, for which print ribbons are now difficult to come by.

However if you get on-line and contact www.buyalps.com you can access their Media-Accessories-Ink Cartridges-Specials and order ribbons, etc. which should keep these printers going into the future. You also perhaps know by now that they run under the SCSI interface (along with many scanners, etc.) and the newer Macs do not support the old SCSI interface. So this means that it may not be time to scrap your old machines if you still want to superb waterproof image print quality

It is very useful because it allows you to modify the clipboard before pasting its contents, and this may make your work faster and more efficient. Starfish generates unique wallpaper patterns for a lively, colourful, and eye-catchingly unique desktop. Starfish creates its images from scratch, mixing layers of fractal and trigonometric algorithms with colour gradients and alpha-channel blending. Starfish Pro is a new interface to the powerful Starfish engine, allowing a new degree in flexibility when rendering patterns. GNU open source, so it's free.



Stargazer's Delight 5.1.1

See the night sky from any location on Earth at any given time. Zoom in and out, display or hide stars, constellations, deep sky objects, planets, constellation boundaries

and so on. Animate the sky and see the stars wander about the sky, see the twilight and the sun rising. \$29



TypeRecorder 1.2.2

TypeRecorder is a utility that records everything that you type on your computer. Every keystroke is saved to a daily file on your computer, available for immediate retrieval. This is especially useful if you want to have some degree of insurance in the case of system crashes, power outages, or any problem that would cause you to lose data. Any data that you enter with a keyboard will be discretely saved. TypeRecorder is also helpful in monitoring unauthorized use of your computer, as it can log the time and application being used when any key is pressed. Requires OS 7.5 or higher. \$15.

SIMPLY MAC

Mac basics we sometimes forget

Installing new software

DID YOU READ THE INSTRUCTIONS? NO? Shame on you. And you complain about problems! Tsk, tsk.

Almost always the instructions ask you to start up without extensions. (Actually, you cannot even RUN the system without the Appearance control panel, so, naturally, it is difficult to turn this one off without actually moving the extension to the disabled folder!) Once you decide to install the new software, reboot. When the smiley mac appears (telling you the disk and memory are working OK), hold down the shift key. Soon you will get a message telling you the mac is starting up with extensions off. Let go of the shift key. (The Appearance control panel will be installed anyhow) When the startup is finished, run the installation. Then reboot without holding down the shift key. The software installer may force the reboot.

Note that if you are installing from a CD and are using a third party CD utility, and you reboot with shift down, you may not be able to see the CD any more. If this is the case, you can't install, so reboot, COPY the installer to your hard drive, reboot with shift down, install from the copy.



Tip O' the Month Burning CDs for backup

CD-Rs are Compact Disks which can only be written to once. Well, sorta. If you HFS-format the disk, you can write only once, and create a single directory. But there are other formats. For instance, with PC Exchange, you can see most PC formats as well as Mac formats. Indeed, you can ISO 9660 format the CD-R in Toast, and some of the limitations are gone. For instance, you can archive half a gig on a CD-R and then modify the contents. Really, what you are doing is adding new tracks and directories and the old stuff is marked as deleted. You will quickly use up all the space on the CD-R (after which you can no longer add or modify stuff), but at least until then you have as much flexibility as a floppy.

You might also look into software such as DirectCD which uses UDF packet writing. This minimizes the cost of rewriting the directory each time. Also, check out WriteCD-RW, a utility which does all the nitty gritty for you to make the CD-R act just like a floppy (a very big one!). Of course, if you use a real CD-RW, you can use the same CD until it reaches its rewrite limit (about 10 times). Check out <http://www.softarch.com/us/products/wcdrwoverview.html>

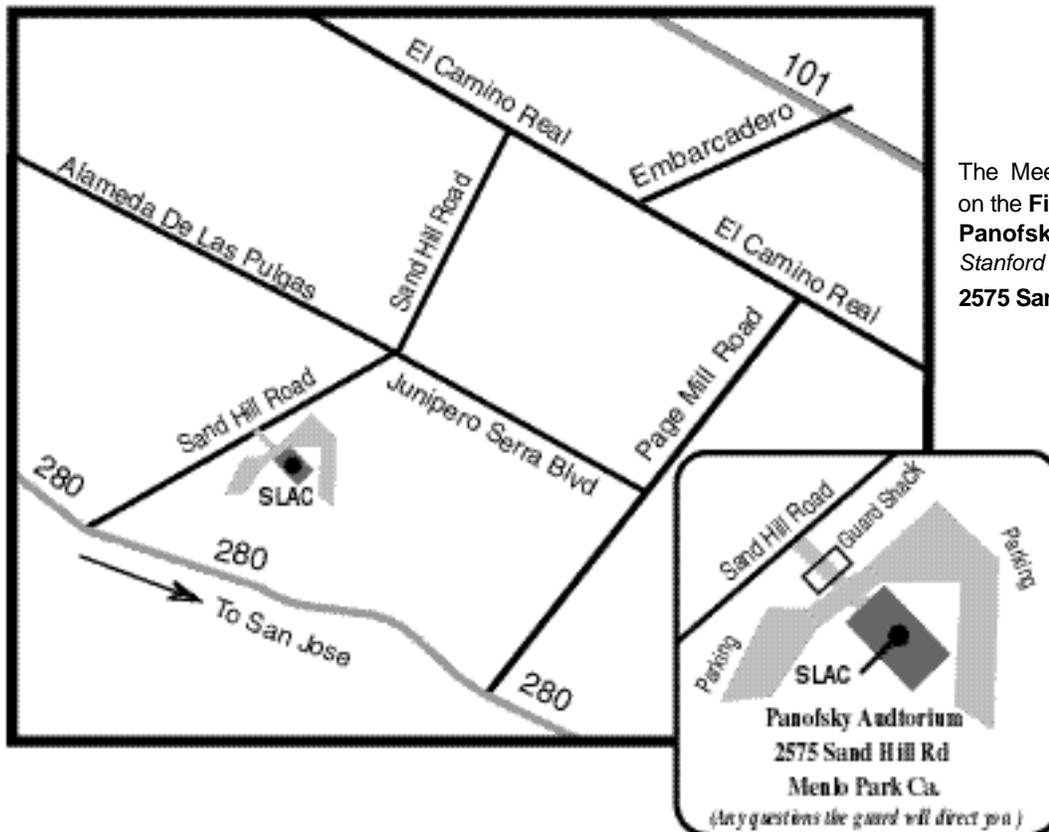
