AmazonShopper 1.2 (OSX)

AmazonShopper is a completely free application that lets you quickly and easily search for products available on Amazon.com and Amazon.co.uk.

- Search for products in a wide variety of categories.
- View as many as 200 results at a time.
- Sort those results by price, manufacturer and name.
- See a picture of the product (if one is available).
- See reviews from other buyers.
- Clicking on the "Buy" button takes you right to the page on Amazon.Com.
- It's completely free to use! (Always a plus)

Dock Hide 1.2.8 (OSX)

This little installer activates, in the Dock, the options to hide an application and to hide all other applications.

EasyPhoto 1.2.5 (Cbn)

EasyPhoto is a very easy to use utility to help create pictures for the web from your digital camera pictures. After explaining all the steps you need to go through to change those 2+ megapixel / 22 inch pictures taken with a digital camera into smaller 6 inch 100K pictures suitable for email, I decided to write EasyPhoto. If you're a PhotoShop guru, this application may not be for you, but if you have a friend, or relative that isn't, EasyPhoto allows you to do all these steps by simply dragging a folder, or camera onto the EasyPhoto window. Allows you to resize, rotate, adjust brightness/contrast and crop images and automatically saves the new, smaller, pictures to an easy to find location. Also supports multiple levels of undo and 13 other picture effects.

iCalViewer 1.0.4 (OSX)

iCalViewer displays the events from Apple's calendar application, iCal, in a window. Each event is displayed in a similar way to iCal and marches towards a finish line which is the time now.

But wait! There's more! iCalViewer also comes as a handy screen saver, iCalSaver!

Although you cannot, at present, interact with individual events, there are options which allow altering the overall display in the preferences dialogue and the 'Window' menu.

osXigen 2.1 (OSX)

osXigen (read it oxygen) is a fully-featured queue-based FTP/SFTP client for Mac OS X. Features:

SBook5 5.05 (OSX)

SBook5 is an extremely fast, AI-based personal information manager for computers running the Mac OS X operating system. SBook5 organizes your information into pages, or entries, with one page for each person, company, or thing that you need to track. Each of these entries can have any number of postal addresses, phone numbers, email addresses, or other information. SBook

recognizes the information that you put into each entry and allows you to intelligently manage it.

SBook5 automatically tells the difference between an entry that represents a person and one that represents a corporation, and sorts accordingly. The database then sorts entries as you would, if you only had the time. SBook5's proprietary searching algorithms search in the blink of an eye. Just type a few characters from the person's name, and SBook5 instantly finds the right entry. Don't know the name? No problem — SBook5 automatically downshifts to full-text search mode, automatically finding all entries that match what you type. Multiple people can have the same SBook5 database open at the same time; when one person saves their file, the changes are automatically reflected in all other instances of the application running on other computers.

Besides incredibly fast search, SBook5 can also dial the phone, print envelopes, mailing labels, and integrate with other applications. And it has an incredibly responsive developer who is always looking for new ideas.

WebPics X 2.6.1 (OSX)

Quickly and easily build web page galleries from your digital pictures. Create thumbnails and captions for each picture, select a back ground color or image and many other options to customize your pages. Includes full online help files.

WebValidator 1.4.1 (Cbn)

Web Validator can validate HTML, XHTML and CSS of whole websites at once. Simply enter the URL of the website, select what to validate (which XHTML/HTML version - can also be detected automatically - and CSS) and which links to follow - you can limit by domains, link depth and directories and click validate.

Web Validator uses the services of the World Wide Web Consortium and so errors in validation are almost impossible.

XLoad 1.4.3 (OSX)

This utility displays the load of the processor on Mac OS X. If you use an MP machine, Xload will display the load of each CPU.

XMonitor 1.9.3 (OSX)

XMonitor displays a wide variety of system information, shows you how much email you've got, checks the status

of remote servers, and is highly customizable.

Monitors: disk, cpu, ram and network usage, PPP status, IP address, Email, Remote Servers and much more. Real-time, auto-scaling graphs of current activity, shows all mounted drive and disk free and used size statistics. Shows: system load, load average, number of users logged in, users logged in, number of running programs and active programs, %cpu used by the system, by user, and idle %, current speed, average speed, max speed, max send/receive speed per session, total sent/received since computer startup and receive/send split, free memory, used memory, wired memory, % of memory used, and total memory available. Disk current speed, average speed, total data read and written since computer startup, max combined speed per session. Total network and hard drive sent/received statistics since system startup and per session.

Casady & Greene Closes, Heralding End of an Era

Closing a Chapter

For 19 years, Casady & Greene Inc. exemplified a refreshingly old-fashioned approach to the software business. The chief executive of the Salinas, Calif., company, for example, was no ambitious young programmer but Charles R. Fulweiler, an 85-year-old former clinical psychologist known for working every day from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., and departing with a trademark "goodnight everybody" to the rest of the staff.

But no more. C&G is closing its doors, hurt both by the technology downturn and broader market changes. The closely held company, which sold software for Apple Computer Inc.'s Macintosh, didn't actually employ programmers. Like book publishers, it packaged and distributed software that was created by others. Unfortunately, notes Vice President Bonnie Mitchell, many of those products now come free with computers or other pieces of software.

Examples include C&G's type fonts, a key technology as desktop publishing emerged in the 1980s; Spell Catcher,

a product that catches typos in other programs that use text; and Sound Jam, a digital music program that Apple bought and used as the basis for its widely used iTunes software. "We were forbidden for two years from discussing that deal," Ms. Mitchell says. C&G considered selling its trademarks, Ms. Mitchell adds, but feared a successor wouldn't uphold its tradition of treating customers like family. Now, its products will revert to control by their authors. "The outpouring of support from customers has just been incredible," she says.

Quark, Inc. marches to its own drummer

Quark, Inc. today announced a Mac OS X native version of its flagship product, QuarkXPress, now at version 6, a mere 27 months after the introduction of Mac OS X. Quark 6 for the Macintosh will begin shipping next week.

Upgrade pricing as per the Quark site is vaguely listed as between \$199 and \$499 depending on the version you currently own. The full product via the Quark store is listed at \$944. Online and catalog resellers will almost assuredly have better pricing.

The release of Quark 6 removes the last major obstacle for a significant segment of the design and print community to seriously consider an upgrade to Mac OS X under Jaguar. We extensively covered the many benefits and few gotchas of this move in a session at our recent seminar "The Designer's Transition to Mac OS X," <http://www.macresolutions.com/report16.html>.

WHAT ELSE IS NEW?

In addition to running natively within Jaguar, Quark 6 also includes incremental improvements over earlier versions. The final release is consistent with the features detailed by John Cruise in his seminar session "Choosing a Page Layout Program for Mac OS X," <http://www.macresolutions.com/report17.html>.

In brief, they include:

- Direct export to PDF version 1.3 (i.e., Acrobat 4 compatibility)
- Layout Spaces, which enables sharing specifications and synchronizing text across various layouts
- Multiple Undos

Those who have made the switch to InDesign 2 or are at ease with Quark running within the Classic Compatibility Environment are already well on their productive ways within OS X. Now the Quark purists and those reluctant to change or upset a workflow must think again.

DO YOU UPGRADE NOW?

Interestingly, the decision is not a slam dunk. Despite the compelling attractions of Jaguar and Apple's hopes for a massive immediate migration, an informed decision still requires reflection. Here's why:

1. QuarkXpress Only Runs in Mac OS X Under Jaguar.

It will **not** run in Mac OS 9, as opposed to say, InDesign 2, Photoshop 7, and Illustrator X. Therefore to keep your Quark workflow in parallel, all users either have to move to Quark 6, or some will have to backsaves into earlier versions. Quark 6 only backsaves into version 5, and you'll need a copy of version 5 to backsaves to version 4. Go from 6 to 4 in one step? Not as far as I know. Also, during each backsaves any content dependent on features exclusive to the new version will be altered.

2. Where's My Plug-In?

Your older plug-ins will not work in Quark 6. They must all be rewritten unless their functionality has been incorporated into version 6. If your work relies on a special third-party plug-in, you may have to wait. Quark says that developers have been working on plug-ins for some time and they should be released rapidly. This does not match what I learned in a recent conversation with one such developer.

3. Is Your Commercial Printer Ready for Quark 6?

Commercial printers had difficulties with early releases of Adobe's new product, InDesign. By version 2 however, released a year ago, the kinks with commercial printer RIPs had been worked out. And even if your commercial printer was not running OS X (and most still are not) they could easily print your file by running InDesign in Mac OS 9. This will not be possible with Quark 6, unless files are saved as PDFs, a desirable although somewhat complicated procedure to get the right results for final press output.

4. How Solid is Quark 6?

Quark and many end-users had a miserable experience with the release of Quark 4. It contained a whole host of problems that were not resolved until the release of versions 4.1 and 4.11 many months later. With the release of version 5 things went smoother, and one of Quark's stated aims for the slow release schedule for version 6 is to get things right. We'll see.

5. Copy Protection

Quark 6 introduces a new copy protection system that ties the software license to the unique hardware address of your Mac. Moving Quark 6 onto another Mac, say the laptop you take to the client, not only violates the license, but requires you to call Quark, explain the situation, and get a different code. Good luck.

BOTTOM LINE

All in all the Quark upgrade is excellent news and well overdue. It fills in a key missing piece in the Mac OS X mosaic and provides another compelling reason to switch to Jaguar, whether it be with Quark, InDesign, or even both.

We will follow up with additional information on Quark and other Mac OS X transition issues as they become available.

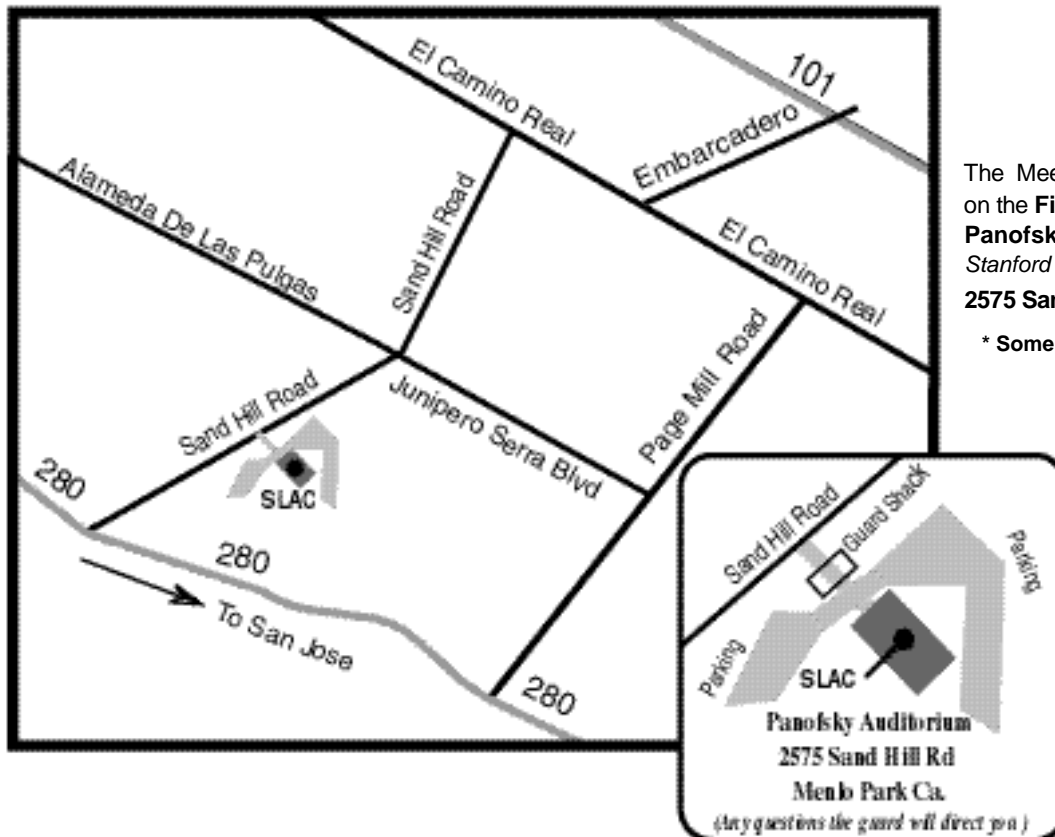
