October Meeting Report Steve Werner, Summit Communications

We were treated to a grand presentation by Steve Werner



at last month's meeting. Steve briefed us on the new Adobe software *suite* called "CS" (Adobe Creative Suite). Their new applications are oriented around optimized interoperability of Adobe's product line. The new CS applications are called Photoshop CS, Illustrator CS, InDesign CS, GoLive CS,

Acrobat 6.0 Professional, Version Cue, and Design Guide. This represents the centerpiece of Adobe's new Creative Pro approach. The Adobe Creative Suite provides today's creative professionals with the tools they need for both print and WEB creation.

Also the following packages represent their Standard "non-suite" applications and consist of new packages (note—no new version numbers, just CS designations) for Photoshop CS, Illustrator CS, InDesign CS, Version Cue, and Design Guide.

- **1. Workspace Management & Document Creation** showing collapsible palettes, named workspaces, a new control palette, keyboard shortcuts, document presets, and a context sensitive Info palette. All these were new features of the CS application.
- **2. Flexibility in Working with Frames** including text frames, a placeholder, a drag text frame, graphic frames, and drag from the desktop which also works word processing & text.
- **3. Integration with Other Adobe Products** showing how to place native Illustrator, Photoshop, and PDF files. With InDesign you can now place spot color, duotone, tritone and quadtone Photoshop files.

Can place DCS files (raster only or photoshop) and they are combined for composite or PDF output use. Can drag art from Illustrator into InDesign if preferences are set correctly, and can work with Photoshop/tiff/eps clipping paths as well as editing paths; and can make text wrap with clipping paths.

- **4. Many New Enhanced Text Features** including a story editor, and nested styles for paragraph & character. Usability enhancements for switching to type tool for immediate editing, opening text frames, selecting text, and previewing a resized text frame.
- **5. Typography enhancements** including a paragraph composer, optical kerning, support for OpenType fonts, special characters, and multilingual support for character attribute of language and use with spell checking and a dictionary.
- **6. Transparency Features** for drop shadows, opacity, feathering on Illustrator graphics, recognizing transparency in Photoshop, checkerboard patterns on pages, and transparency flattener presets.
- **7. Tables**. How to select objects, placing tables, cell options, header first row, alternating options, auto expanding text cells, and creating a table from scratch.

Using any browser that supports tables and forms (and Java for the File Manager module), you can setup user accounts, Apache, DNS, file sharing and so on. Webmin consists of a simple web server, and a number of CGI programs which directly update system files like /etc/inetd.conf and /etc/passwd. The web server and all CGI programs are written in Perl version 5, and use no non-standard Perl modules.

SuperBladePro 1.1 (OSX & Cls)

- **8. Layers**. How to turn them on and off, locking layers, text wrapping can now be suppresses on a layer basis (for versioning), and composition preferences to set text wrapping to only objects below.
- **9. High Quality Display/Preview Modes** including zooming in, turning on HQ, overprint preview and preview mode, creating bleed and slug areas in document setup, and previewing bleeds and slugs.
- **10. Drawing Enhancements**. InDesign already has similar drawing tools to Illustrator and Photoshop, new Path (under Controls), new stroke style editor, and ability to apply dotted line on left of page gap color.
- **11. Mixed Ink Support** for selecting a spot color, and can also create a mixed ink group (new).
- **12. Separation previews** using a separation palette (new) and an ink limit preview.
- 13. Pre-Flight/Package/Print using the print dialog box.
- **14. PDF Export**—can export directly to Adobe Acrobat 6.0, with new options to create PDF/X-1A or PDF/X-3 for blind transfers and

interactive PDFs. There are also bookmarks and hyperlinks palettes, and a button tool for creating interactive buttons with a way to embed movies and sounds.

InDesign Tips

Make InDesign Palettes think for You

If math isn't your strong suit, you'll be relieved to know that the numerical text boxes in all InDesign palettes can perform the type of math you may need to use while working in a document. With the right key, InDesign can add [+], subtract [-],multiply [*], divide [/], or calculate a percentage [%]. For example, if you want to move a selected object one inch (or whatever unit system you 're using)to the right, you don 't have to work out the new horizontal position — simply type "+1" after the current value in the X Location text box in the Transform palette and then press "Enter." Select the entire value if you want to replace it with a complete equation, such as 1.25/2.25. Don't know the answer to that? InDesign does!

Panther Precautions: Recommendations for Upgrading

Today marks the official ship date for Mac OS X 10.3 "Panther" (some users have already received their installation CDs).

Over the next few days many MacFixIt readers are going to be partaking in the upgrade experience. So today would appear to be a good time to revisit our recommendations for upgrade procedures that can reduce the number, and severity, of problems you might experience. (In this discussion, we're focusing on those users upgrading from an earlier version of Mac OS X.)

First, keep in mind that Panther is a major upgrade to Mac OS X, with significant changes to both the visible feature set and the underlying code. As such, many thirdparty utilities and applications — especially system addons — will need to be updated by their developers to ensure compatibility. Be sure to check with the developers of your frequently used software to ensure that you have Panther-compatible versions. (For example, the website for Default Folder X, the popular Open/Save dialog utility, warns that versions 1.8 and earlier will cause all applications to crash under Panther; users should be sure to update to Default Folder X 1.9 or later.) If you have third-party system add-ons — preference panes, menu utilities, contextual menu plug-ins, Services, etc. Panther, be sure to disable them by removing them from the appropriate folder inside /Library or ~/Library. Likewise, if a particular application isn't compatible, be sure to remove it from your Login Items preferences, if applicable, so that it doesn't launch at login. If you're not sure about specific software titles or add-ons, disable them until after the upgrade, and then try enabling them one at a time to test them for compatibility.

Second, although you should be backing up important data regularly anyway, it's especially important to back up such data, or even your entire hard drive, before undertaking any kind of major system upgrade. If for some reason you encounter serious problems, it's a lot easier to simply restore your system from backup than to try to rebuild it from scratch.

Finally, if you want to avoid many problems, be a conscientious upgrader; although there are always going to be issues with updates and upgrades, many of the reports we receive at MacFixIt after minor or major system updates cover issues that are actually problems with the user's own system. For example, minor disk and/or permissions corruption can prevent an update from installing properly, and sometimes changes from an update can reveal existing issues that were previously unidentified. By taking a few precautions — such as making sure your hard drive is in good shape — you can often avoid many of these issues.

Below is a set of procedures we recommend. Although it would be nice if there were no "maintenance" needed when installing an update, our experience is that such maintenance can, and does, make the update process go more smoothly, and in fact has allowed us to avoid many minor problems. To be fair, these procedures will take a bit of time; however, they take less time than dealing with some of the issues they can help you avoid.

- 1. Before installing Panther, check your startup drive for damage, and repair it if necessary. The easiest way to do this is to boot from the OS X Install CD and run Disk Utility (from the Installer menu). Click the First Aid tab, select your hard drive in the drive/volume list, and click "Repair Disk." (If you know how, you can instead start your Mac in single-user mode and use fsck, as this runs the same repair routines.) If you have a third-party disk utility such as Alsoft's Disk Warrior, you can also run that for good measure.
- **2.** Before installing Panther, boot from your hard drive again and repair permissions on your boot volume. To do this, launch Disk Utility (located in /Applications/Utilities), click the First Aid tab, select your hard drive in the drive/volume list, and then click "Repair Disk Permissions." (It's important that you do this while booted from your hard drive, rather than from the OS X install CD or another volume, in order to perform the "correct" repairs.)
- **3.** Install Panther. (See the tip below, "More info for Panther upgraders," for more information about installation options.)
- **4.** After installing Panther and then booting from your hard drive (you should now be starting up into Panther!), again repair permissions via Disk Utility as described in *Step 2*. This will ensure that any system-level permissions that may have been corrupted or changed incorrectly installers are notorious for this are reset to the correct values.

By following the above procedures, you're not assured a problem-free upgrade, but you'll certainly have a "healthier" installation, which may help you avoid many of the issues that befall haphazard upgraders.
