Just select the word or name and hold down Command+Option+G. (Requires OS X 10.2 or higher and Safari). The following is adapted from the "1-Click Answers" website where you can download this application.

The Soundbridge comes in three sizes, with a remote control, and each of the units is small enough to place anywhere—on a shelf, bedside table, etc. and supports a wide range of music formats including WMA, AAC, WAV, MP3 and AIFF. ## Shareware News March Demo Items

### WinSwitch 3.0b

Apple did a superb job with its new Fast User Switching feature in Panther (Mac OS X 10.3), but for users with long names, the associated menu item is a terrible waste of precious Menu Bar real estate.

Wouldn't it be nice if you could access the feature through a compact, icon-sized Menu Bar icon? WinSwitch does exactly that, closely matching the performance and style of the Apple-provided menu, but without all the bulk. In fact, it even corrects some problems with Apple's menu by eliminating certain "daemon" users which shouldn't show up in the list, and by improving the alignment of user icons in the menu. WinSwitch gives you rapid access to the Accounts preference pane, and is completely customizable, allowing you to choose from six different menu bar styles: Standard icon, User picture, Full username, Short username, First name only, and Initials. You can also optionally display the root user, define a hot key to take you back to the login window, and adjust the size of your user pictures both in the menu bar and inside the menu itself. For power users, WinSwitch can automatically run applications and scripts of your choosing whenever you switch in or switch out.

### SwapMenu 1.1

SwapMenu is a small Status Item-based Mac OS X application. It runs in the background and places a global item in the menu bar which displays the size of the virtual memory swap files currently in use on your computer. You can add SwapMenu to your login items in order to save the trouble of having to launch it every time you log in. SwapMenu is written in Objective C for the Cocoa APIs and is distributed under the terms and conditions of the Free Software Foundation's GNU General Public License.

### Tofu 1.2

Tofu helps address the common problem that people don't like reading text on the screen. Why is that, anyway? I believe there are two main reasons: line width and visual instability. Text is usually very wide on the screen, which makes going from the end of one line to the begin-

ning of the next difficult. That's why newspapers have narrow columns: It makes them faster to read.

### Goban 3.2.2v65.2

Goban is a Go board application for Mac OS X. Use it to play Go against GNU Go or other players on the Internet; or to analyze and browse game records.

*Requires OS X 10.1+. Free.*



### Carbon Copy Cloner 2.3

Carbon Copy Cloner is a backup/cloning utility for Mac OS X. This version adds many new exciting features such as synchronization, scheduled tasks, creating disk images on the fly, and creating NetBoot and Apple Software Restore-prepared image sets from fully customized installations of Mac OS X. CCC is the most cost-effective, easy-to-use backup solution available for Mac OS X.

### ImageBuddy 3.1.3

ImageBuddy with its simple and intuitive interface lets you rotate, size, crop, mask and layout your digital photos for printing in just a few simple click. Need 20 wallets and a 5x7 of each member of the soccer team? No problem with Image Buddy's built in event page you can create standard "packages" that you reuse over and over again.

### Play Sound 1.5.2 (Cbn)

Play Sound is a simple, no-fuss sound player for classic Mac OS and Mac OS X. It supports QuickTime sound files (for example, AIFF or MP3 files), Mac OS System 7 sound files (files with a file type of 'sfil' that contain 'snd' resources), or any 'snd' resources embedded into any file. You can play an unlimited number sounds concurrently or one at a time. You can loop sounds, repeat sounds, control the volume of sounds played, and press the Escape or Command-Period key to abort sound play.

To use Play Sound as a simple sound file player, simply drag and drop the sound file(s) onto the Play Sound icon in the Mac OS Finder. Better yet, configure the Finder to open sound files with Play Sound when you double-click them (see the Play Sound documentation for easy instructions showing how to do this).

Play Sound is also fully scriptable, allowing AppleScript writers to use simple, easy-to-understand English syntax to play most QuickTime-supported sound files, Mac OS

System 7 sound files, and ‘snd ‘ resources that are embedded in script applets. To script Play Sound, you call it from an AppleScript script or application.

### **TinkerTool System 1.35**

TinkerTool System is a professional maintenance tool for Mac OS X. It allows you to change advanced operating system settings and offers a wide variety of maintenance features. The latest version comes with powerful new functions, e.g. verifying the integrity of preference files or removing superfluous language packages. (NB: this is complementary to the free TinkerTool, not a superset.)

**Requires OS X10.2.3+. \$10.**



### **SafariSource 1.6.1**

SafariSource is a SIMBL plugin that adds HTML syntax coloring to Safari’s view source window.

**Requires OS X10.3+. Free.**

### **2. PUT YOUR DESKTOP ON THE DOCK (OS X)**

A Quick Tip From Rachael Smitley, Your Guide to Focus on Macs. at [http://macs.about.com/od/osx/qt/desktop\\_dock.htm](http://macs.about.com/od/osx/qt/desktop_dock.htm)

If you’re frequently minimizing windows to get to files on your Desktop, save some steps and put the Desktop on the Dock. By putting the Desktop icon on the Dock you have one-click access to everything you need. Here’s how: First,

click on *Macintosh HD – Users – yourname – Desktop*. Then, drag the Desktop icon to the right side of the Dock.

### **3. SIDETRACK Trackpad enhancer**

SideTrack is a replacement driver for most Apple PowerBook and iBook trackpads. With SideTrack installed, the standard trackpad works like a multi-button scrolling mouse. (You may have read about the similar feature built-in to the recently announced PowerBooks that have USB trackpads.) SideTrack is multiuser aware and fully compatible with OS X 10.3 (Panther) and fast user switching; it is also compatible with OS X 10.2 (Jaguar). Every user on your PowerBook or iBook can have different settings depending on their needs.

You can leave your external mouse at home and take full control over your trackpad:

- Vertical scrolling at left or right edge of pad.
- Horizontal scrolling at top or bottom edge of pad.
- Map hardware button to left or right click.
- Map trackpad taps to no action, left click, left click drag (with or without drag lock), or right click.
- Map trackpad corner taps to mouse buttons 1-6 or simulated keystrokes.
- Extensive control over accidental input filtering.

SideTrack is shareware; registration is just \$15 (US). Unregistered copies of SideTrack will periodically remind you to register. Registered users receive technical support and free upgrades. You can turn your trackpad into a powerful multi-button mouse for less than the cost of a quality external mouse! This application is from Raging Menace Software (the same folks that brought you MenuMeters). You can find SideTrack at: <http://www.ragingmenace.com/software/sidetrack/>.

### **4. THIS IS BROKEN** A website of interesting things that don’t work

[www.thisisbroken.com](http://www.thisisbroken.com) chronicles things that should work, but don’t – at least don’t work the way they should or were intended. This site was begun by Mark Hurst and is aimed primarily at business to help them improve their customer experience. Widely credited for popularizing “customer experience” online, Mark Hurst has worked since the birth of the Web to make Internet technology easier to use. In 2002, Hurst was named “one of the 1,000 most creative individuals in the U.S.” in Richard Saul Wurman’s book 1,000. InfoWorld magazine named Hurst *Netrepreneur* of the Year in 1999.

## 6. MAC CLASSIC/OS 9 TROUBLESHOOTING - EXTENSIONS CONFLICTS

**Resolving startup problems.** If your Mac (OS 9 and earlier) hangs at Startup, you may need to resolve extensions conflicts (note that Mac OS X does not experience this problem). Extensions are items that extend the capabilities of the Macintosh operating system and are installed when, for example, you attach a peripheral such as a printer or external drive. In effect these extensions become part of the operating system. It is likely that these extensions will at some time cause startup problems. To resolve these problems it is necessary first to resolve the startup conflict and then identify which extension is causing the problem.

### To resolve the startup conflict, you will need to disable all extensions at startup:

- Restart your Mac
- Press and hold SHIFT until MAC OS screen appears with the words Extensions off or Extensions disabled
- A dialog box appears, asking if you want to rebuild the desktop
- Click on OK

If your Mac now starts up OK, you'll need to resolve extension conflicts.

### To resolve the extensions conflicts:

- Click on Apple Menu - Control Panels - Extensions Manager
- Click on Edit - All Off
- Activate half of the extensions and/or control panels you typically use
- Close Extensions Manager
- Restart your Mac
  
- Repeat this process (this time activating half of the extensions and/or control panels you enabled above) until you are able to identify and remove the problematic extension.

If the problem does not recur:

- Repeat this process (activating the remainder of the extensions/control panel and disabling the ones you first activated) until you are able to identify and remove the problematic extension.

an Apple Design Award for Most Innovative Apple Technology. The software tracks the flight paths of more than 850 actual satellites and has simulated space views of earth and its orbiters. Enjoy a free screen saver and get a special .Mac discount on the full version of this dazzling software.

MicroMat, of course, has developed TechTool Pro 4, a fine utility for OS X maintenance and recovery. Did you know that they also offer a free "lite" version usable up to OS 9.2.2? It can be downloaded from MicroMat's website: <http://www.micromat.com/> Further, if you buy an AppleCare plan, it includes TechTool Deluxe, an abbreviated version of TechTool Pro.

Panic Software began as two guys developing shareware in an apartment in Portland. Panic has a product called Audion that has now been retired and can be downloaded and used for free: <http://panic.com/audion/buy.html>. Audion started out as a competitor for SoundJam, but when iTunes arrived, Audion lost the battle. Version 3 of Audion has numerous features that iTunes doesn't, but it won't work with the iTunes Music Store. If you go to Panic's website and follow the "learn more" link, you can read a lengthy, but extremely fascinating history of how Audion began, initially competed with SoundJam, and how Audion almost (maybe) became iTunes instead of SoundJam!

Scott Sheppard of Inside Mac Radio has a well done website called OSXFAQ: <http://www.osxfaq.com/>. Among its many features is a Tip of the Day that can be subscribed to via email or researched via the website's archives. A recent tip described how Google in Safari (maybe Google anywhere) could perform as a calculator! In the example given, you would enter (55+66)\*77 into the search box, press Return, and get the answer on the Results page. (It's also humorous to see what other results appear on that page!)

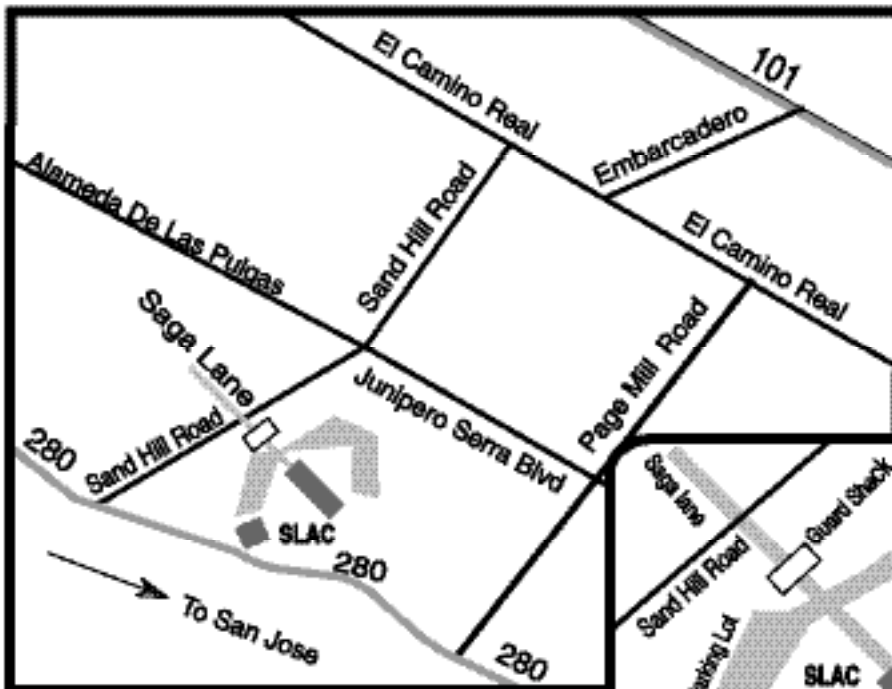

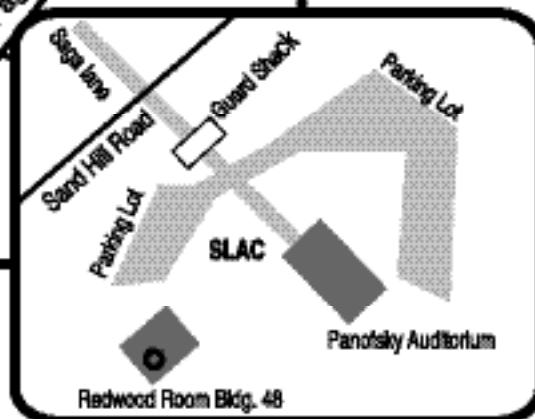
