Gerry A. Brown, CISSP

is a Senior Security Engineer with thirty years of Computer Science and ten years of Security experience. Mr/ Brown did his Computer Science studies at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo and graduate work at UC Santa Barbara where he was an early participant in the ARPANET. Following graduation he went to work for a Swiss company that provided one of the first X.25 networks. Later Mr. Brown joined the team at Apple where he led the DFT, X.25 and ISDN efforts. After a ten year break to consult, Mr Brown returned to Apple in the early 90s as a charter member of Apple's Security Team. There he implemented the Encrypt command in the OS9 File menu and worked on the internal security architecture of the Macintosh. In the late 90s, Mr Brown joined the team at Liberate Technologies where he was responsible for Client Security (including JAVA) and contributed to both the Security and Architecture Committees.

Since leaving Liberate, Mr Brown has concentrated on security and web development. He has participated in an intrusion detection investigation; updated websites for the new security requirements of PHP; designed MySQL searches for the USDA nutrition database; and developed commercial websites. Mr Brown has built several Macintosh OSX applications in support of the Venturi Wireless Client/Server application to speed up EVDO communications. (Data across digital cellphone carriers).

As a member of the Founder's Circle for the RSA Security Conference, Mr. Brown maintains an up-to-date view of security in the computer industry. His focus is on using the Macintosh securely on the Internet.

Jack is a retired 25 year Los Altos Foothill College speech communication lecturer, textbook author and published writer of children's stories and mystery novels. He was a paratrooper in the 11th Airborne Division and has served as President of the Commission on Instruction for California Association of Community Colleges. He uses a Mac and his first book was a children's story (using MacPaint no less). He also writes poems and is a member of the California Writers Club.

His first novel, *Hillview*, was published in 2001. The setting was a small college in Northern California. It portrayed a speech teacher in the 1960s protesting the war and coping with his mid-life crises. Jack bicycles regularly and has made trips through the Loire Valley in France and the Connemara in Ireland. Leith Speights is a **QSA** Application Service Consultant for the west coast for **QUARK**, makers of the renown **QUARKXPress** page/ document/ desktop publishing application. He brought along the latest version 6.5 to demo/discuss (and to present a full copy for our raffle). Quark also makes **QuarkXPress Passport** (for foreign languages) and the **Quark Publishing System**.

Lee showed how to easily create a new “Project” using any one of 25 size layouts. Features of vers. 6.5 include 30 multiple undoes, a new **WEB** palette, extensive preferences list, **and** creates PDFs within an application. It has layers, contextual menus, retains the famous measurements tool so still able to bold/italicize type etc. Is able to sync text (changes all in the document by synchronizing colors and text). Multifunctional image editing package to transfer, scale, rotate and crop.

Fonts— can use Type 1 or OpenType, and can download 65 Linotype OpenType fonts. Tables—contains a new “tables” box; can group multiple tables; uses apple-script functionality; can remove gridlines; and can link to external data/Excel.

WEB docs.—imports Photoshop files into Quark with extensive layer manipulation/merging/lock/and show. QXP 6.5 is backward compatible for 1 version only (ie;QXP v. 5) An activation code is required for installation (for 3 installs) then must call tech support which is free and unlimited. **AND**, the best news: you **CAN BUY** a real manual from Quark.

Leith did a great job of presenting and really knew his stuff working thru the many questions. Thank you.

Now I'm inspired to dig out the rest of the electronics gear that is sitting doing nothing in the garage because I don't want it to be dumped in land fills here or in some less fortunate country.

Of Mice & Macs

Ever since extensive time spent working with Adobe products convinced me that it might actually be easier to use a 2-button mouse,



I've been searching for a better mouse and building up an embarrassingly large collection of rejected products. After all, it's hard to beat the build quality of the Apple product - what's more, having made the plunge

into the world of alternatives, it's hard to resist the blandishments of competing ideas: 5-button mice; different types of scroll wheel; weird shapes that will definitely mitigate that arthritic pain in your right hand; etc; etc. After all, if you spend much time at the computer, you definitely spend much of the day holding the thing, and you want it to function as well as possible. Or perhaps like a lot of other things we now do all the time that once seemed so miraculous - driving or flying come to mind - familiarity breeds contempt and we get annoyed if the thing doesn't just work properly immediately.

Anyway, I've never really got the hang of alternatives to mice such as the finger pad on the iBook and Powerbook, so I've always been on the look out for a small mouse I could take with me when traveling. For a long time I used a Kensington mouse with a cord that could be extended and sprang back inside the mouse when you weren't using it, but the cord did get in the way in a tight spot and on the iBook the USB port is unaccountably on the left side of the machine. With the advent of Bluetooth, however, I was on the lookout for a cordless mouse and I came across the RadTech BT500 (see picture) at this year's MacWorld. It fits neatly in the hand and slips easily into the pocket, it matches the look of the Powerbook too, you can switch it off when you aren't using it and surprisingly the batteries (2 AAAs) last a long time even if you forget to do this, much longer than a Kensington USB mouse that I tried previously.

In fact, I was so pleased with it that, taking advantage of the special offer that Frank Smith negotiated with RadTech for a special 20% SMUG discount (key in Discount Code SMUG20RT when buying at the RadTech website www.radtech.us) that I bought the mid-size version (BT510). It's a little larger and has a cord you can plug in to your USB port if the batteries die. I've been using it a lot although I must admit to not being quite so happy with this one. The shape isn't quite so pleasing and it's so sensitive that it tends to wander off around the screen unless you grasp it firmly and click off to the side somewhere. If my hand grows tired of it, I do have two alternatives to choose from, however, including the very solid feeling Apple bluetooth mouse - just a pity it has only the one button!

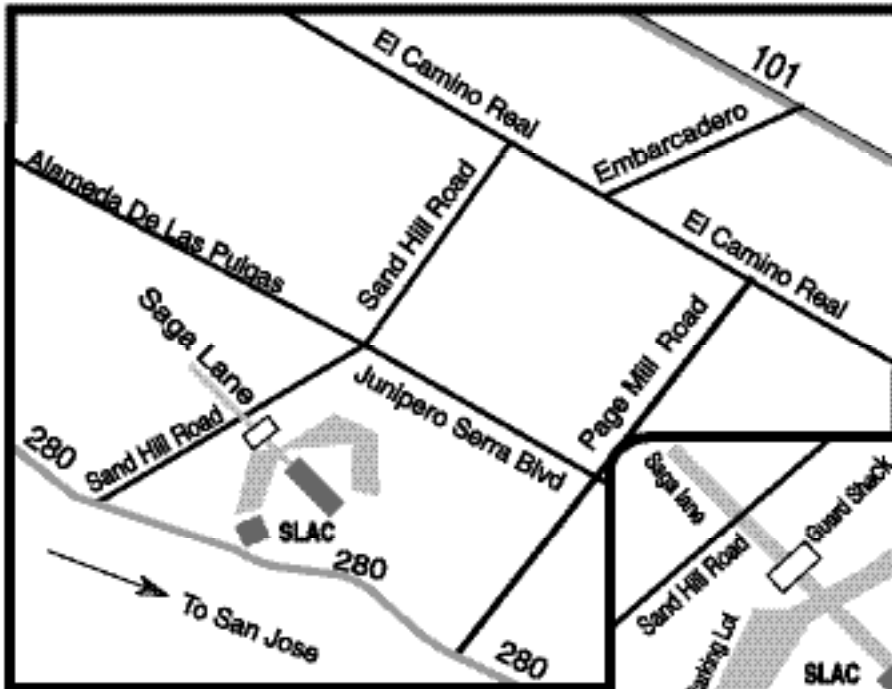

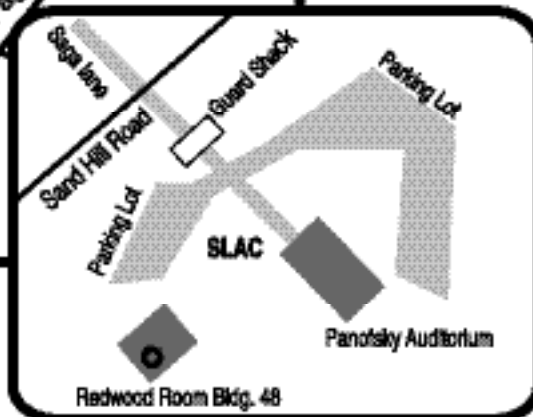
